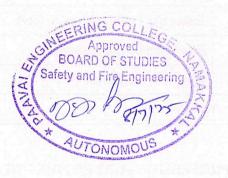

#### CONTENTS

- 1. The objective of the Industrial Training is to enable the students to get practical knowledge towards the handling of safety and fire equipment's in a reputed industry or institution.
- 2. The training involves hands on training of safety equipment's in industry, case study in safety measurements / arrangements which have been used in industry/Institute and emerging techniques in fire safety.
- 3. Groups of not more than four members in a group will carry out the training.
- 4. The students are required to undergo Industrial Training during the vacation of around 2 Weeks / 40 45 hours in a reputed industry or institution.
- 5. The students who wish to undergo industrial training, the industry chosen for undergoing the training should be at least a private limited company.
- 6. The students shall submit and present the progress report at the Institute at least thrice in this duration for internal assessment. The presentation will be attended by a committee.
- 7. At the end of Industrial Training/Internship, the candidate shall submit a certificate from the organization where he / she had undergone training along with a brief report.
- 8. The evaluation shall be made based on the report submitted along with the presentation and a Viva voce Examination, conducted internally by a three member Departmental Committee constituted by the Head of the Institution.
- 9. For evaluation of industrial training, a committee consisting following faculty members. (1) Head of Dept. concerned. (2) Industrial Training program co-ordinator (3) any other staff member of department concerned may be formed

#### DESCRIPTION

- 7. The same team of faculty will evaluate the Project Phase I report. This evaluation will form 50% of the internal assessment mark. The remaining 50% of the internal assessment mark will be given at the end of the 8<sup>th</sup> semester, at the time of completing the full project work.

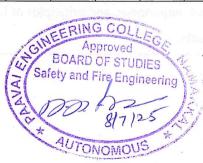
